MESSAGE | From the Centre Executive Director



The Board of Directors and the Staff of the Children's Treatment Centre of Chatham-Kent have worked hard over this past year with the singular goal of offering the best service possible to children and teens in our community. I wish to highlight and thank all staff for their incredible commitment and going the extra mile each and every day to ensure all our clients' needs are met. The employee profiles in this annual report highlighting Laura, Sarah and Tracy are evidence of the degree of dedication and expertise seen in our Centre therapists. As staff work to address the challenge of increasing needs and expectations for our traditionally high quality service across the community, they are committed and positioned to utilize their skill sets effectively over the upcoming years. To provide them with the foundation they need to operate and meet their goals, the Board initiated and underwent a thorough strategic planning process in the fall of 2013, facilitated by director Beth Cummings.

Our new strategic plan is the culmination of the many ideas and collective wisdom of our stakeholders, including our valued community partners and client families. It is anchored by our newly drafted Vision Statement: "Amazing kids today ... Enriching our community tomorrow". While our plan is forward looking, it is grounded in our strong history. The plan highlights four strategic directions with a focus on Programs, Funding, Staff and Infrastructure.

Deliver programs and partnerships that meet the needs of our kids & families

- Review programs/partnerships continuously to ensure they meet community needs and demonstrate quality service
- Increase accessibility of services to better meet client needs
- Minimize the wait time for clients requesting assessments of services

Secure adequate and annualized funding

- Secure annualized funding tied to inflation from Ministry of Children and Youth Services
- Receive funding from Foundation to support programs as well as special needs that arise
- Define and leverage revenue generating opportunities

Develop and support a skilled, innovative, professional team

- A strong leadership team, leading by example
- Highly skilled professional employees who embrace learning
- A strong culture of caring, open communication, recognition and accountability

Ensure sufficient infrastructure to support our programs

- A safe work space
- Sufficient space to accommodate the changing needs of programs, staff and clients
- Information technology that enables improved client service and family communication

Looking ahead, as the Centre has significantly enhanced programs and community outreach over the past few years, the need to ensure a strong service framework and appropriate infrastructure was identified as key to sustainability and to support future growth. The tactics highlighted below reflect this need and have been identified as priority areas for action this year. A measurement and monitoring program is in place to ensure we reach desired results.

Programs:

Establish care paths for:

- children with mild and moderate needs for both Centre and Full Day Kindergarten regarding occupational therapy, physiotherapy and speech language therapy services
- children with autism spectrum disorder
- children with motor speech needs

Establish model for behaviour therapy/supports for Centre clients

Infrastructure:

- Advance our capital building case "Securing Our Children's Future" with feasibility study to update space needs and to attain interim space recommendations
- Upgrade capacity and security of information technology infrastructure
- Review staff work stations with a goal of preventative health

Funding:

- Incorporate Centre's funding needs in the Foundation's planning process
- Establish best practise for therapy contract positions

Our success depends on combined efforts, and I greatly acknowledge the contributions of our clients and families, staff, Centre directors, Foundation directors and staff, volunteers, donors, government agencies and community partners. I wish to express deep thanks to everyone who steps forward to make a difference in the lives of Chatham-Kent's children.

MESSAGE | From the Outgoing Chair



“Amazing kids today...enriching our community tomorrow”.

That’s our vision at the Children’s Treatment Centre for every child that comes through our door. Realizing this vision requires courage, hard work, forward thinking, dedication, and dreaming big! This year was no exception. The collaborative work of so many people help our Centre accomplish truly great things.

This past year we were excited to have Ontario Children and Youth Services Minister Teresa Piruzza tour our Centre where we showcased all the wonderful and creative work we are doing to enrich the lives of our kids. This also gave us the opportunity to advocate to government our specific needs and wishes.

Children’s treatment centres across Ontario saw a \$3.25 million investment from the government to specifically address the amount of time children have to wait to receive services for physical, occupational and speech and language therapy. This is critical for families to ensure their children receive the right services at the right time. A further \$5 million investment had been committed for this coming year.

In February, Minister Piruzza introduced the Ontario Special Needs Strategy to improve services for children and youth with special needs and their families. This initiative will improve early identification of special needs in children and improve how service planning is coordinated and remove barriers to seamless rehabilitation services.

We have been fortunate to cultivate a great relationship with the Thamesville Sertoma and LaSertoma Clubs and the Sertoma Foundation of Canada. We are greatly appreciative of their donation of \$20,000 to our Centre which made possible the purchase of Auditory Brainstem Response testing equipment. We are the only facility west of London with this equipment. Among other things, it enables our audiologists to test newborns, children and adults that are unable to participate in traditional hearing evaluations. This year, the same club also provided a gift of a sit-to-stand assist recliner to upgrade our testing booth.

Chatham-Kent’s Best Start partnership, which includes our Children’s Treatment Centre, were proud recipients of a Ministry of Children and Youth Services’ Community Integration Leaders (CIL) Grant. Our community was selected to pilot new and innovative approaches to enhance the level, quality and seamlessness of services available in Best Start hub locations and to explore ways to help front line agency staff better support families to connect to additional services.

Our Centre is one of only three in the province that is currently participating in a Full Day Kindergarten pilot project working with the Ministry to provide rehabilitation services in the school setting for our young clients. A review of this pilot is underway by the Ministry to determine how this model brings value to programs for children, parents, teachers and rehabilitation service providers.

Our space constraints continue to grow as the Centre is serving more clients, employing more staff, and offering new programs and services. We recognize that our current building is bursting at the seams. Work has begun to secure funding to assist in a capital expansion of our thirty-year-old home to better serve the community.

Fiscal 2013-2014 has been a year filled with many successes and accomplishments. Every day children and families come into our Centre carrying their dreams with them. Every day, staff, volunteers, government and community partners help them get closer to realizing their dreams. It has been my absolute privilege and honour to serve as Chair of this amazing organization.

SPECIAL EVENTS | From the Past Year...

Challenger Baseball Flash Mob

For more than a decade, the Centre has offered an adapted baseball program to clients in the summer. The season usually ends with a final game under the lights at Rotary Park - a big treat for the kids. Summer 2013, a group of staff and individuals decided to surprise the team and their parents with a flash crowd. More than 150 surprise fans filled the stands, as shocked parents and kids stood still in awe on the field and in the stands. Local singer Brooklyn Roebuck started the game with “Take Me Out to the Ball Game” and Centre staff, Foundation directors and members of the Chatham Brewers baseball team joined the kids on the field. Greg Hetherington introduced each player like a star as the cheerleaders from Ursuline College cheered for the teams. The players left the game more confident, more proud, and ready to show the world that kids of all abilities can do anything.

Home Depot Playground Gazebo

After the successful grand opening of our accessible therapy playground late last spring, kids from across the municipality enjoyed a summer of adventure on our nature-themed equipment. We quickly realized that the playground needed more shade. The management and staff at Home Depot in Chatham were quick to step up, donating the materials and labour to build us a beautiful gazebo in early October in the playground area. With just a few finishing touches remaining, we are excited for families and therapists to enjoy the shade this summer.



Simply Queen Tribute Concert

Music lovers and Foundation supporters packed the nearly sold-out St. Clair College Capitol Theatre in September 2013 for the Simply Queen tribute concert. An exciting pre-party in the theatre’s upstairs lounge, hosted by Stephanie and Dale VanderMeersch and Peter Jamieson of Dundee Wealth Management (now HollisWealth), got VIP ticket holders into the rock spirit. The real highlight of the evening was a special black light performance of the Muppets’ version of “Bohemian Rhapsody” during intermission featuring several very proud clients of the Centre. Foundation director Darrin Canniff was the brainchild behind the event, helping to raise \$17,000.

5th Annual Retro Suites Mosaic Art Gala

A small but generous crowd helped the 5th Annual Retro Suites Mosaic Art Gala held October 18 at the Centre clear \$18,600 for the Urgent Needs campaign. The event featured live and silent auctions of artwork created by Centre client children under the guidance of local professional artists Tracy Bultje, Melissa Fernandes and Cathy Myers. Guests were entertained by the acoustic duo '57 Chevy and Centre clients served up delicious cuisine dressed as chefs. The art gala has raised a total of almost \$120,000 over the past five years.



Derek Whitson and the 2014 Sochi Winter Paralympics



This winter, former Centre client and ambassador Derek Whitson headed to Sochi, Russia for the Paralympic Games. Derek and his Team Canada Sledge Hockey team faced some fierce competitors but managed to bring home the bronze medal after a tough game against the USA. Our Centre was lucky enough to host Derek's homecoming where he was greeted by more than 150 fans who couldn't wait to meet and pose with Chatham-Kent's Olympic hero (and the surprisingly heavy bronze medal)! Our clients loved hearing about his journey from playing sledge locally through the Centre program to his time now with our national team.

McDonald's White Glove Dinner

More than 100 guests were treated to a fine dining experience with a twist in February as McDonald's Restaurant welcomed the Children's Treatment Centre Foundation for our first ever White Glove Dinner, an idea borrowed from a northern Ontario children's treatment centre. The restaurant was transformed with linens, centrepieces and silverware as celebrity waiters in tuxes served guests a special three-course dinner. A violinist serenaded the crowd while Ronald McDonald himself chatted and posed for photos with guests. After the tables were cleared and the red carpet rolled up, more than \$4,500 was raised for the Urgent Needs campaign. The evening would not have been possible without the generous donation of Rechel and Wade Crosby, owners of the St. Clair St. McDonald's location, and their managers and staff who worked tirelessly to tackle the challenge of plating McDonald's food on china.



SuperKid Run Series

This past year Foundation staff formed a new partnership with Ben Labadie and Lindsay Vandersluis, the organizers behind the SuperKid run series around southwestern Ontario. With a goal of promoting healthy lifestyles for kids of all abilities, the partnership kicked off with the SuperKid Reindeer Run in December. More than 150 kids of all ages and abilities participated in the fun 1, 2 or 3 km run around Kingston Park wearing red noses and antlers. The fun continued in February with the SuperKid Glow Run, a night time run encouraging kids to get outside and active during the colder weather. In early April, the SuperKid Easter Egg Run and Hunt once again saw more than 150 kids dressed as bunnies run around the park, then collect eggs to win health-related prizes. Through sponsorships, registration fees and donations, almost \$2,500 was raised in support of our Urgent Needs campaign.

“Christmas in Muskoka” Christmas Party

As our Centre continues to grow, so does the space needed to host events. This past year the Centre and Foundation joined forces with the Lambton-Kent District School Board’s “Christmas in Muskoka” fundraiser for a “Polar Express” kids’ Christmas party at The Armouries. More than 350 clients and their families joined us for a magical evening of entertainment, crafts, food and spirit. Kids were even able to whisper their Christmas wishes to Santa throughout the night.

Union Gas Pi(e) Day

March 14 (3/14) is regarded around the world as “Pi Day”, celebrating the mathematical constant 3.14. For a second year, Michael Whitehouse of Union Gas organized a benefit Pi(e) Day fundraiser for our Foundation. Employees of Union Gas could purchase a variety of pies by the slice and had the opportunity to throw a pie at various members of their management team. When the last bite of pie had been eaten, this year’s Pi(e) Day fundraising total was nearly \$6,000, all earmarked for our Urgent Needs campaign.

Clowning for Kids

Thanks to the participation of several Chatham-Kent schools, daycares and businesses, the first ever Clowning for Kids fundraiser was a success, raising \$1,800 for the Urgent Needs Campaign. For a ‘toonie’, participants would receive a red clown nose to wear on April Fools’ Day. Every child in participating classrooms received a nose so all were included. Two local schools, Our Lady of Fatima in Chatham and Harwich-Raleigh in Blenheim embraced the day by getting their entire school involved. Teachers and kids dressed up as clowns and held silly activities all day. Value Village in Chatham not only collected donations for the noses, they also held a pie throwing competition where staff could throw a pie of cream at their manager. Nu-Co Plastics in Blenheim celebrated Clowning for Kids all day long with a benefit BBQ and a competition for the best clown costume, raising nearly \$800 for our Foundation.



“Blame It On Rio” Festival of Giving

On Saturday April 12, more than 1,100 people packed the John D. Bradley Convention Centre for the 13th annual Festival of Giving. With a “Blame it on Rio” theme, an entertainment packed line-up and all the tastes of Brazil, guests were dazzled by the sights and sounds of this year’s Festival. Hundreds of silent auction items donated by local businesses and donors plus an exciting live auction rounded out the evening. More than \$307,000 was raised, benefiting local children’s charities and all Chatham-Kent food banks. Starting as a pasta dinner in a church basement, after 13 years, the Festival has raised well in excess of \$2 million for charity.

The award serves to highlight that our youth develop their strengths to become strong citizens, have a positive impact and make a difference in our community.

Holly is a dynamic, motivated young adult from Tilbury who enjoys photography and listening to classic rock music in her spare time. Holly has been committed to self awareness and skill development. STAFF SPOTLIGHT | Laura Burritt, *Occupational Therapist*



It wasn't always Laura Burritt's plan to become an Occupational Therapist. In fact, when she headed to Western University to receive her Bachelor of Science in Biology, Laura was looking at other career options when she discovered Occupational Therapy. Laura quickly completed her Masters of Clinical Science for Occupational Therapy at Western and was hired by the Centre immediately after graduating in 2001.

Laura works with a variety of children of different ages and abilities. She works with other therapists to help children work on goals to increase their independence with daily activities. Over the past few years, Laura's duties have expanded to include working from hubs around the community, including schools and daycares in Wallaceburg where Laura grew up. By working out in the community, Laura is able to provide children who might not normally receive therapy with quality services that encourage their skill development, something she is very proud of.

Working at the Centre for the past thirteen years, Laura has developed a close relationship with the families she works with. For her, watching clients develop new skills and reach new milestones is the most rewarding part of her career. Working closely with the families, Laura is able to celebrate alongside the families and watch the kids develop their true potential.

STAFF SPOTLIGHT | Tracy Koehler-Massender, *Speech Language Pathologist*

Tracy has come a long way from her farm roots in Thamesville and as she headed off to the University of Windsor to pursue a degree in psychology with her personal belongings in the back of a horse trailer, she knew she was about to start a new adventure. Tracy was unsure of which career path to take, but knew she wanted to do something that would make a difference in someone's life. After job-shadowing a friend who was a Speech Language Pathologist, Tracy found her passion. She completed her schooling at Wayne State University while working part time at the language clinic at the university and at John McGivney Centre in Windsor. The Centre hired Tracy immediately out of school in 1994.

Tracy has seen a lot of changes over the past 20 years, the most significant being the changes in technology and the change in doctors' attitudes towards speech needs. The demand for speech therapy has grown over the years as doctors no longer tell parents that their child will grow out of their speech issues. As changes in technology and services have evolved, Tracy has kept a positive attitude of doing what is best for the kids and their families - even if it requires her to learn how to use a computer and ever-evolving software.

For Tracy, the most gratifying part of her job is watching clients grow from struggling to be understood to using words, phrases and devices to find their own voice. Tracy's passion for her clients is obvious. Every time a child proudly smiles or a parent cries when their child speaks for the first time, Tracy is smiling and crying alongside them. Their successes are her successes. It is her hope that clients who are non-verbal will continue to find their voice in a supportive community.
